# **Cognitive Developmental Milestones for Children**





A reference guide on multidirectional cognitive development for children aged up to 3 years (Information extracted from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention<sup>1</sup>)

2 Months Old	<ul><li>Starts to smile at people</li><li>Tries to look at parents</li></ul>	<ul><li>Makes soft murmuring sound</li><li>Turns head towards sounds</li></ul>	<ul><li>Pays attention to faces</li><li>Begins to trace things with eyes</li></ul>
4 Months Old	<ul> <li>Smiles ad lib especially at people</li> <li>Enjoys playing with people</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Starts to babble</li> <li>Cries in different ways to express different feelings, e.g. hunger, pain</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Recognizes familiar faces and things at a distance</li> <li>Traces moving things with eyes from side to side</li> </ul>
6 Months Old	<ul> <li>Loves to play especially with parents</li> <li>Loves to look at self in a mirror</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Makes vowel sounds when babbling, e.g. "eh", "ah"</li> <li>Responds when being called own name</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Shows curiosity and approaches things that are out of reach</li> <li>Starts to transfer things from one hand to another</li> </ul>
9 Months Old	<ul> <li>Wants to stay close with familiar adults</li> <li>Has own favorite toys</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Makes many different sounds, e.g. "mama", "baba"</li> <li>Points at things with fingers</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Searches for things as seen being hidden</li> <li>Transfers things smoothly from one hand to another</li> </ul>
12 Months Old	<ul> <li>Gets attention by repeating sounds or actions</li> <li>Has own favorite people and things</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Tries to repeat words you said</li> <li>Uses simple gestures, e.g. shaking head for "no", waving hand for "goodbye"</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Finds out hidden things easily</li> <li>Puts things into and takes things out of a container</li> </ul>
18 Months Old	<ul> <li>Wants to stay close with caregivers in unfamiliar situations</li> <li>Shows others something interesting by pointing</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Says a few single words</li> <li>Says and shakes head for "no"</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Points to one of the body parts</li> <li>Scrawls on his/her own</li> </ul>
24 Months Old	<ul> <li>Imitates others especially adults and older children</li> <li>Feels excited when getting along with peers</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Says 2 to 4 words in a sentence</li> <li>Points to named things or pictures</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Finds out hidden things even under 2 to 3 covers</li> <li>Starts to distinguish shapes and colors</li> </ul>
36 Months Old	<ul> <li>Cares about a crying friend</li> <li>Takes turns when playing games</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Talks by using 2 to 3 sentences</li> <li>Carries out instructions with 2 or 3 steps</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Plays toys with buttons, knobs and moving parts</li> <li>Completes puzzles with 3 to 4 pieces</li> </ul>



# Red flags for cognitive developmental problem<sup>2</sup>

## **Emotional / Social Concerns**

- Poorly developed age-appropriate playing skills
- · Difficult in interacting with peers appropriately

### **Communication Concerns**

- Poorly expressed with language and gestures for communication
- Difficult in understanding language in words, gestures and pictures

### **Cognitive Concerns**

- Poorly developed basic concepts towards shapes, colors and body parts
- Difficult in learning new tasks

A detailed follow-up evaluation should be established as early as possible if any signs of cognitive developmental delay are observed in children during growth period.
